

SERVICE STRUCTURE INSIDE THE A.A. GROUP







(Oldest AA Clubhouse West of the Mississippi River)

AA in Oklahoma began in Oklahoma City on September 14, 1941. In late 1942 there were about 6 alcoholics attending meetings at the Biltmore Hotel and at a member's law office. Meetings at the Biltmore continued for less than a year. After that, the small group of original members met in homes and a few of the churches. They finally found a small building to rent on 42nd Street just off of Western Avenue in late 1943. It was the group's first real home. They remained at this location for about a year and a half, during which time there was quite a bit of growth in membership.

Bill Wilson came down and spoke at the 42 nd Street club house on January 18, 1944. A photograph of the event was taken with about 75 people attending. (The photograph can be seen hanging on the west wall at the Kelley Club). This was Bill's first trip to Oklahoma.

In 1945 the group was asked to leave the 42 nd Street location. For a little over a month the group met everywhere; churches, homes, the courthouse, and a little theatre building. They referred to this time as the "40 days in the wilderness". They finally ended up settling at the old Shrine Auditorium on NW 4 th Street, where they remained for several months. It was during this time that the group decided to build their own Clubhouse. In late 1945 they started taking subscriptions from the members. Everyone made a pledge to give so much money to get started on the new building. One member contributed \$2,000; another member donated the property. The location was at NE 22nd and Kelley Avenue. It became known as the Kelley Street Club. Construction was completed and the Clubhouse opened its doors on Monday, June 10, 1946. There was a mortgage on the property that was paid off in less than a year. To celebrate the group had a "mortgage burning" party.

Very soon after its opening, there developed a great disharmony among the members. This was happening all over the country with just about every group that built a clubhouse. The fighting would sometimes get personal and a small group would split off and form their own group. This happened 4 or 5 times early on, which helped AA in Oklahoma to grow even more. They had beginner meetings before the Friday night meeting from the start of the clubhouse. On Monday night the wives were invited to attend. Other meetings were on, Tuesday (women's group) and Thursday. A Young People's Group started around 1954.

Today the Kelley Club enjoys a variety of Groups holding weekly meetings, including Night Creatures, Kelley Nooner's, Sundowners, Monday Night Mixed Group, Tuesday Night Women's, Tuesday Night Men's, and Thursday Grapevine. The rich history of the Kelley Club is a vital part of AA in Oklahoma. Not only was it founded by the original members of AA in Oklahoma but throughout the years, many of its members have made significant contributions to the growth and stability of AA in the State of Oklahoma.

#### **Step One**

"We admitted we were powerless over alcohol—that our lives had become unmanageable."

Step one is centered around the idea of admitting powerlessness over alcohol. In simple terms, it means recognizing that you cannot control your drinking and that it has become a problem in your life. This acknowledgment is the first step towards recovery. It emphasizes honesty and self-reflection, encouraging individuals to understand that their attempts to manage their drinking have not worked and that they need help to overcome their alcoholism. It's about accepting the reality of the situation as a crucial part of the healing process.

#### **Tradition One**

Our common welfare should come first; personal recovery depends upon AA unity."

This tradition emphasizes the importance of unity within Alcoholics Anonymous as essential for the success of individual recovery.

This means the well-being of the entire group is more important than any one person's interests or desires. When members prioritize the unity of the group, it creates a supportive environment that helps everyone in their recovery journey. By working together and supporting one another, individuals can find strength and encouragement. This tradition encourages members to put aside personal disagreements and focus on the collective goal of helping each other stay sober.

#### **Concept One**

"The final responsibility and ultimate authority for A.A. world services should always reside in the collective conscience of our whole Fellowship." refers to the idea that "Final authority rests with the group."

This means that the ultimate decision-making power lies with the individual groups within AA, rather than a central authority or organization. Each group has the autonomy to govern itself and make decisions that best

Concept one emphasizes the importance of group conscience, where members come together to discuss and decide on matters affecting their group. It promotes democracy and encourages participation from all members, ensuring that everyone has a voice in the decision-making process. This structure helps maintain the integrity and effectiveness of the AA program, allowing groups to adapt to their unique needs while staying true to the core principles of Alcoholics Anonymous.

#### **Step Two**

"Came to believe that a Power greater than ourselves could restore us to sanity."

This step encourages individuals to open their minds to the possibility of a higher power, which can be understood in various ways—whether as a traditional concept of God, nature, the universe, or even the collective strength of the AA community.

In simple terms, Step 2 emphasizes the idea that recovering from addiction often requires support beyond one's own willpower. It invites people to trust in something greater than themselves to help them regain control and find balance in their lives. This step is about fostering hope and embracing the idea that recovery is possible with the help of this higher power, leading to a healthier mindset and lifestyle.

#### **Tradition Two**

"For our group purpose, there is but one ultimate authority—a loving God as He may express Himself in our group conscience."

This tradition emphasizes that the guiding force for the group is a higher power, which can be understood differently by each member. It suggests that decisions within the group should be made collectively, based on a shared sense of values and beliefs, rather than by any one individual.

Tradition Two promotes unity and collaboration, reminding members that their group's decisions should reflect a collective conscience, guided by a sense of love and support. It encourages members to seek guidance from this higher power during discussions and decision-making, fostering a spirit of harmony and cooperation within the group.

#### **Concept Two**

"The General Service Conference has the final authority in the world service affairs of Alcoholics Anonymous."

This means that the General Service
Conference (which is made up of
representatives from AA groups around the
world) is the highest decision-making body in
AA's service structure. It has the ultimate
responsibility for overseeing the organization's
actions and ensuring that they align with the
principles and traditions of Alcoholics
Anonymous.

Concept Two emphasizes the importance of collective decision-making and accountability within the AA service structure. It reinforces the idea that the voice of the groups is paramount, and that decisions should reflect the needs and experiences of members. By giving authority to the General Service Conference, AA aims to maintain unity and effectiveness in its mission to help individuals seeking recovery from alcoholism.

#### **Step Three**

"Made a decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God as we understood Him."

In simple terms, this step encourages individuals to let go of trying to control everything in their lives and to trust in a higher power to guide them. It involves making a conscious choice to surrender personal will and seek support from this higher power, however one may define it.

Step Three is about accepting that you cannot do it all alone and that relying on something greater can lead to positive change. It encourages members to take a leap of faith, allowing themselves to be guided by their understanding of God or a higher power, which can help them navigate their recovery journey and lead to a healthier, more fulfilling life.

#### **Tradition Three**

"The only requirement for AA membership is a desire to stop drinking."

This tradition states that anyone who wants to join Alcoholics Anonymous only needs to genuinely want to stop drinking alcohol. There are no other qualifications, such as religious beliefs, background, or specific behaviors.

Tradition Three emphasizes inclusivity and openness, making it clear that AA welcomes anyone who is struggling with alcohol addiction, regardless of their circumstances. It fosters a supportive environment where individuals can come together based on their shared goal of recovery, free from judgment or barriers to entry. This principle encourages members to focus on their common purpose and helps create a sense of belonging within the community.

#### **Concept Three**

"To insure effective leadership, we should endow the General Service Conference with the traditional rights of leadership."

This concept emphasizes the importance of strong and effective leadership within the General Service Conference, which oversees the broader activities of Alcoholics Anonymous. It suggests that the Conference should have the authority and rights necessary to guide and support the organization effectively.

It highlights the idea that leadership is not just about authority but also about responsibility and service. It encourages leaders to act in the best interests of the AA community, ensuring that the needs of the groups and members are met. By empowering the General Service Conference with these traditional rights, AA aims to maintain a strong and cohesive direction while upholding the principles and values of the organization.


